INTO AUTUMN

With very little time left in the season, it seems obvious that we have had another unusual year. Only one month this season—January—has given us above-average rainfall and February was less than 20 per cent of normal. Resources

Everyone who reads this will have had the experience of coming upon a flower or a plant and asking: "What *is* that?" Well, here is one way to go about getting an answer to your question. It's called—in shorthand—Zimflora.

Zimflora refers to http://www.zimbabweflora.co.zw/. As we go to press, Zim flora has **14,012** images for **3059** species, of which **2934** are native or naturalised and **125** are purely cultivated. A <u>Site history</u> page gives details of the latest additions to the site. There is also a <u>frequently asked questions page</u>.

Post your pictures and questions on the website, and we'll almost guarantee you that you'll receive a well-informed and probably authoritative response.

This is a website that needs to be widely publicized among all plant-lovers in Zimbabwe...and further afield.

There is a good article on the Aloes of Malawi in the 30/2012 issue of *Bradleya*. Entitled 'The genus *Aloe* L. (Asphodelaceae: Alooideae) in Malawi', the authors are Ronell. Klopper, Stewart. Lane, Gladys Msekandiana-Mkwapatira and Gideon. Smith.

With its rich mosaic of habitats owing to the varied topography, altitudinal ranges and rainfall found in different areas, Malawi harbours at least 21 different aloes, three of which are endemic to the country. Because of extreme population pressures on the limited land area, aloes in Malawi are severely threatened by habitat destruction and many species are in dire need of conservation.

The article provides a key to the aloes of Malawi, as well as a description, illustration, distribution map and information on habitat, flowering time, and conservation status for each of the species. [Note that both distribution maps and flowering times are missing from the magnum opus published by Kew Gardens, *Aloes: The Definitive Guide*.

The plant sale is our real showcase event, so do get busy now repotting, doing labels and making sure your plants will look their best on the day.
