False Start

The rain we had two weeks ago and then last Friday gave hope that we might be in for an early start to the rain this year. No such luck however, our rainfall is such that you can almost set a clock by its real timing. The 80% chance of getting a planting rain for the summer cropping season is around about the 15 November in Harare. However you would be well advised to look at your garden and activities and see what is really practical in a drying City. The authorities have stopped extraction of groundwater in the City limits for sale and imposed stiff taxes on any water that is pumped from dams and reservoirs around and about. It is not going to get any easier, the ground water is dropping, boreholes are either dying or gasping so before the rains come in earnest decide what is a practical garden for you and adjust accordingly. But water-thirsty trees, especially those that are not deciduous, should be minimised and plant mainly indigenous species that roll with the seasons. It's time to bring the Aloes back!

Indigenous tree:

We will also be posting each month a photo of an indigenous tree which you can consider for planting in your home landscapes. This month's is *Sterculia quinqueloba* which many of you will recognise as a starkly beautiful tree on the granite kopjes of Mashonaland. In winter it sheds its large leaves and stands proudly in the winter sunshine and lets the warmth through to the ground level. Which is what you want, because as we get older we need to warm our bones quickly so that we can move about freely during daylight hours gardening.
