Indigenous tree:

This month we feature two trees, not one. The first is *Phoenix reclinata* a very cosmopolitan palm found almost everywhere in Zimbabwe. It tends to clump and in the photo it is underplanted by *Aloe arborescens* and here at the foot of Leopard Rock Mountain they make quite a stunning sight. The first flowers of this tree aloe are just starting to come through, but *arborescens* is more usually flowering in June. Your Society will be undertaking a trip to Buchwa Mountain in June of this year so that members can see tens of thousands of these trees in full flight! Both kinds of tree are easy and fast to grow and can easily survive and thrive on whatever season we receive!
