The Battle of the Giants

In our garden at Hillside in Harare this intriguing battle is taking place. As you know a baobab is the one tree that can take severe damage to the bark and stem because of the remarkable ability to heal itself. Many large baobabs are in fact fusions of several smaller ones that were growing close together when young and their stems and branches melded into one amorphous mass over the centuries that the tree had already lived.

So here we have a liane, *Fockea multiflora*, which is now tightly entwined around the baobab and the question is, will it choke off the stem and limbs of the baobab, or will the tree actually grow over and around the liane and allow it to continue to grow through the stems eventually? Both may live happily ever after, conjoined in a formidable, but botanically illegal, union.
