#### Directions

From town, go out Borrowdale Road past the race course. Just before Sam Levy's Village, turn left into Cameron. No. 23 is toward the far end on the right.

#### The Day

The day starts with the customary tea when you arrive, so please remember to bring a plate of eats to share. Remember also to bring chairs and hats as well as a plant or other contribution for the raffle and/or auction. Following tea, there will be an open discussion on water-wise gardening. This will start with a short introduction, and then we'll have a roundtable and ask members to contribute their own success stories—or dramatic failures!-- in managing gardens in the face of water shortages. With enough suggestions, we can put together an article for *Ingens*. After the discussion, Elmarie will give us a guided tour of her garden...and water-wise practices.

### A New Aloe

In 1984, Tom McCoy first came upon an *Aloe* in South Africa that did not seem to match any of the known species. Four years later John Lavranos came across the same *Aloe*, collected one and took it to Portugal, where it has flowered for him every year. Only 12 years later, sitting on a beach in Yemen, did the two of them start a discussion that has resulted in the recognition of a new *Aloe*.

This new species appears to be restricted to a single site in the eastern highlands of South Africa. Here the plants grow in fairly solitary fashion among exposed sandstone boulders, or flat rocky outcrops, on otherwise grassy slopes. This is a summer rainfall area with frequent winter frosts. Despite searches in surrounding areas, it appears this taxon is restricted to a single location. Interestingly, like our *A. ortholopha*, this location is in close proximity to chrome mining.

The new addition to the genus Aloe was named in honour and commemoration of Barbara Jeppe, the well-known *Aloe* artist whose lovely book on the South African Aloes was first published in 1969.

Below is a general view of part of the colony of *Aloe barbara-jeppeae* at the type locality. Most plants have already developed the normal red colouring of the winter period.



#### An Aloe Mystery...solved?

Caryl Stutchbury was in Vic Falls in August a few weeks before we were, and she has posted photos of some of the Cataract Island aloes on the ACSSZ website. She was told by a guide that they were "Veld Aloes" (google=*Aloe greatheadii*), but Caryl noted the flowers appear far redder than typical *A. greatheadii*. See Caryl's photos on the website.

Darrel Plowes has told us that the Vic Falls *Aloe* is a form of *A. chabaudii* somewhat akin to var. *verekeri*, which grows in mopane woodland in the Gwaai River area. It was evidently well-known to *Aloe* afficionados back in the 1950s, including Larry Leach and Oliver West, but Darrel is not aware of anyone collecting it. A black & white photo of it was published somewhere at that time, but Darrel can't recall where.

Sounds like the Vic Falls guides need some updating on identification and nomenclature.
