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PEAK ALOE FLOWERING TIME APPROACHES

It has been another unusual rainy season, and it is hard to predict what the outcome will be as the weather cools and we get closer to peak Aloe-flowering time. Not that this need bother the far-sighted gardener since, with a mix of the appropriate species and a few well-chosen hybrids, it is possible to have Aloes in bloom 12 months of the year.

With the plant sale approaching, now is the time to think about diversifying your mix of succulents. After all, a season that doesn't suit Aloes particularly well is likely to make some other succulents happy. So be open-minded.

From Borrowdale Road: To Crowhill & right into Stonechat. Turn left into Gaydon at the Roundhouse—T-junction--then the 4th road right into Warwick Rd—after passing the dam on your right. Then it's the 3rd house on the left. Opposite is No. 52, where they are building a 3-storey house.

From Harare Drive: Take Gaydon to the south end of Warwick Road (2nd right). But this route is in poor condition and the numbering is rather capricious.

Update on Ewanrigg

Four members of your committee visited Ewanrigg this week to view the progress that has been made on rehabilitating the plant collection and the garden generally. Manfred has been very actively collaborating with the staff at Ewanrigg and, in line with the objectives stated in our constitution, the Society is now seen as working well together with the Ewanrigg Garden. One need identified during the visit however is that Ewanrigg needs assistance with chemicals and fertiliser. Your committee will be considering using some of the funds generated from our plant sales to purchase and donate chemicals and fertilisers, and committee members would like to hear the views of the membership regarding this proposal.

Another new Aloe

Jean-Bernard Castillon has been a very busy man lately and has just described another Aloe species from the vicinity of Taolagnaro (Fort-Dauphin) in Madagascar. During a visit to the flower market near Lake Anosy, in Antananarivo, Castillon bought a very peculiar Aloe, but the seller had no idea of its origin. This Anosy market, which sounds like a fascinating place, has plants from sources throughout the world, but only those belonging to the family *Asphodelaceae*. Castillon subsequently grew the plant, which flourished during the following season. Its curious mix of features intrigued him. In August 2011, during a trip to the south of Madagascar, he was surprised to see the same plant in cultivation in the town of Taolagnaro. Investigations led him through the garden of a private property to the gardener's house, thence to a woman doctor, and eventually to a local horticulturist who had found this plant in the wild, near Ifarantsa, east of the Andohahela range. This plant is consequently a true species, new to science, and has been named *Aloe mottramiana*. *Cactus World* 29 (4)
