Subs

A gentle reminder that those of you who have not yet paid your subs for 2013 will be unable to vote at the AGM. No, we won't read out your names, but we will have the forms at the AGM so you can pay there. We'll also have the Society name tags for those who have not yet collected theirs. Remember what we wrote in the last newsletter about (probable) free access to the Botanic Garden for the plant sale if you wear your name tag. So, if you want a name tag and will not be at the AGM, you can phone or email us in the last week of May to make a plan to collect yours before the sale.

Plant Sale—Sunday 26th May

For those who plan to sell, a copy of the plant checklist accompanies the newsletter. Short notes are at the bottom of the checklist, and some of these points are emphasized here.

Each plant seller must have a vendor number (VN). To obtain your VN, phone Hans Wolbert, who will assign the VN. It is to your own advantage to have your VN before the sale because you will need it to prepare for the sale. All your plants must be individually labelled (on the special 2-part labels provided) with the species name, the price & the vendor number. Plant sellers should also wear their Aloe Society name tags.

A new procedure: sellers **must** deliver their plants to the Botanic Gardens on Saturday afternoon. The Society is providing security from then through until Sunday morning.

Your plants will be checked in by a Committee member on Saturday, and sales begin only at 9am Sunday morning and continue until 3pm. The minimum price is \$1, and all prices must be rounded to the nearest dollar. When a plant is sold, the purchaser will have to take it to the cash desk—with the help of the workers and wheelbarrows that will be present. At the end of the sale, a Committee member must check out your unsold plants.

The restaurant/tea shop in the Botanic Gardens is now open again.

A New Book

A new and much-anticipated book (by well-known Kirstenbosch botanist Dr Ernst van Jaarsveld, together with Uschi Pond), on a unique plant is to be launched in July 2013—with the title *Uncrowned Monarch of the Namib – Welwitschia mirabilis*. This lavishly illustrated volume (430 photographs and 49 art works) aims to provide (in 298pp and bilingual German and English text) background knowledge of the plant to the professional and amateur botanist alike. Topics include: botanical background, conservation, its odd ecology, cultivation, habitat, where to find it, history, plant art, and evolutionary history.

Welwitschia is an extraordinary plant. With the family, genus and species all rolled into one, Welwitschia mirabilis is unique. A rarity among rarities, it is found only in the Namib Desert extending from Namibia to Angola. Throughout the biological world and since the discovery of this bizarre Namib endemic in 1859, no other single plant has aroused the curiosity and attention of so many scientists. Welwitschia is the national plant of Namibia and a true flagship species of the Namib Desert. Although not the prettiest, it is the most peculiar and advanced due to its amazing botanically engineered life form with an incredible capacity to survive the Namib desert environment. It is no small wonder that Welwitschia is one of the most researched desert plants in the world. This book explains not only where Welwitschia fits into the biotic world, but also its adaptations to a dry desert environment and its place in the Plant Kingdom.

With a limited edition of 1000 copies, the book will become a collector's item. The ex-publisher's price is R685/US\$94 (excl P&P) and the book may be ordered from uschipond@telkomsa.net.
