For Your Diaries

The ACSSZ is hosting an international congress—"Succulents—Plants for Our Future"—in Harare the last week of June. The three-day jam-packed congress will feature speakers and presentations from all over eastern and southern Africa, numerous vendors of plant art and plant-related products and several post-conference tours and outings. We have not done this sort of thing for over 25 years, so it will be a very special event. Put June 20-22 in your diaries. The programme is still being finalized, and complete details will be sent to the full membership and will also be posted on the Society website.

La Rochelle

Both the Tree Society and the Orchid Society have recently visited La Rochelle, one of our National Trust properties, to assist with cataloguing and organizing plant collections. Information supplied to us by the National Trust had indicated that there were (in 1978) at La Rochelle 320 species of trees, shrubs and other plants, 13 species of palms, 6 species of *Cycadaceae* and 101 *Aloe* species—plus 14 identified *Aloe* hybrid crosses. Thinking a visit by the Aloe Society might make an interesting outing and be useful to La Rochelle in identifying and managing the *Aloe* collection, we visited La Rochelle in January to assess the prospects for such a visit. Not only did the place seem to be completely abandoned and locked up but also we could only locate a grand total of four aloes—of three different species. This seems to confirm what Darrel Plowes had told us—that years of baboon damage and poor management had destroyed the *Aloe* collection. So not recommended for a visit.

Dealing with Illegal Plant Vendors

Many of you have asked how to report the plant vendors so often found on our street corners. As a reminder, it is illegal to sell—without a licence—any indigenous *Aloe* or orchid. While most of what you see being sold has been poached from habitat, some has also been stolen from local gardens. National Parks is keen to protect all indigenous plants and asks that you report illegal vendors to any of the following: Mr Matipano (0772-116 389), Mr Nhira (0772-104 390) or Anna Pasipanodya (0772-572 044). Save these numbers. Another reminder: It is illegal even to possess indigenous aloes—as well as Sabi and Lundi Stars, indigenous palms and cycads—without the certificate issued by the Society. [Your current certificates are being mailed/delivered with *Ingens*.]

An Experiment

Because your committee knows that many of you have church or other commitments on Sunday mornings—and thus we don't see as much of you as we would like, the Society is going to experiment with having outings at different times.
