# **Seed Bank Update**

new stock of seeds for early planting, but timing glitches mean the purchased seed won't be available until November. However, in our travels to the far corners of Zimbabwe and beyond into South Africa, we did collect seed from a wide range of species: Aloe cryptopoda. A. greatheadii, A. castanea, A. marlothii, A. daweii, among others. These will need thorough drying before they're ready, but they'll be in the list to be distributed in November. We also visited the Walter Sisulu Botanical Garden, near Johannesburg, and explored the rockery that Andrew Hankey described in his landscaping talk at the Congress. Most amazing were the resident black eagles and the Aloe pluridens growing on the vertical cliff faces next to the Witpoortije Falls. Unusually for botanical gardens, there is an excellent nursery selling only South African plants. Hoping to be able to acquire additional seeds and books, we also visited the Pretoria Botanical Garden, but we were unsuccessful because the herbarium was closed because of
