Four posteriors in a row!!!!

Members might well ask what on Earth does this have to do with a respectable Society like ours????

Well everything, you will be pleased to know. These are the stripped (obviously), lopped seedlings of the Borassus palm. They are considered a delicacy in East and West Africa where locals leave Borassus palms wherever they occur. They harvest the fruits, very similar to the more common Llala palm in this part of the world, germinate them and then chop them off at the base, boil them, defrock them and sell in the market to dribbling consumers.



However while some people preserve the palms to get fruits for seedling production, others cannot resist tapping the growing point for the sap that is the main ingredient of palm wine.

So a verdant palm (left), can quickly become a dying member like our friend on the right. He has had his very life-forces drained right out of him. Locals believe the seedlings confer extraordinary bedroom skills on men and fatten the buttocks of women to satisfying proportions.

Travelling to far-flung countries can lead to some amazing discoveries. In Nigeria the locals around the Jos Plateau grow what they call Acha or Hungry rice. This is not rice at all although other than the seeds which are tiny, in colour, aspect, growth habit and environment generally the plants at a cursory glance look just like rice. It is grown because the seed apparently has almost zero carbohydrates and particularly sugars and is therefore ideal for people suffering from Diabetes. It is known as *Digitaria exilis* to Botanists.
