Those who attended the Xerophytica 2014 International Congress will remember Philip's very interesting presentation on "The African endemic genus *Encephalartos*".


As an authority of the *Encephalartos* genus he was doing a lot of work on the separating the *E. manikensis* complex. Philip presented 4 papers at the last Cycad conference in Colombia in August 2015 and will be greatly missed by all that knew him.



Armchair Journey

Hold onto your seatbelts! For now you are privileged to see this sneak preview of one of the massive granite ridges that run like giant ramparts to the precipitous edge of the Nyauri Valley just northeast of Ngomakurira in the Chinhamora Communal Lands. *Aloe cameronii* is a many-splendoured community player in this breathtaking view. Right now the plants have this coppery-red colour to their leaves but by June they will be out in all their floral glory, parading up and down the mountain slopes, tempting the unwary and unwise to lean over dangerously to capture the very best, mega-pixelled shots. We will take the brave and stout-hearted to this mountain wilderness in June to see them flowering.

Do not tumble, because tumbling will be terminal!



Along the way we shall pass by these fairy gardens of green lawns surrounded by *Xerophyta* plants with a herding instinct. In the Miombo woodland there will also be colonies of *Aloe chabaudii*, some of which may also be flowering at the same time.

The rocky mountain slopes will be wounded with the blood red leaves of *Hymenodictyum floribundum* or firebush. This is a near-succulent tree that can only survive where it is protected from the ravages of fire. Join us to see these wonders of Gondwanaland!!





I am a little bit blessed in that my work often involves taking me to some of the most picturesque places in Zimbabwe and neighbouring territories. This craggy mountain is an outlier from the Great Dyke, near Mutoroshanga. We will only have lived this year if we kick our shoes off, atop this mountain, and feel the granite of Gondwanaland beneath our toes. Who is up for it??????

The Health Corner
