Saturday 24 June 2017—Harare Open Gardens Day.

Herewith more detailed directions to the various gardens:

Start — Caryl and Glenn Stuchbury's at 1 Sunlands Close, Umwinsidale

The time: 10.00am for 12.00am

Directions: Travel out of town on Borrowdale Road.

At Helensvale Service Stations, turn RIGHT into Crowhill Road. Travel 1.7km and after Christchurch, turn RIGHT into Carrick Creagh Road. After 2.7km and turn LEFT into Borrowdale Brooke Lane (through Police Road Block.) Go 4km, past the President's house and at T-junction turn RIGHT into Luna Road (strip road.) Follow for 300m and turn RIGHT into Sunlands Close. At the end of the Close, turn LEFT into No 1.

2nd - Doreen Richards at 24 Southam Road, Greystone Park.

The time: 12.00am for 2.00pm

Directions: Travel back towards town on Borrowdale Brooke Lane, turn right in to Carrick Creagh Road. Then turn first left into Gaydon Road follow Gaydon for about 3 km, turn right at the 6th road on the right this is Winchcome Road, then 2nd left into Southam Road, No 24 is on the right just before getting to the top of the hill. "Welcome to Sohwe Falls"

Another spectacular Zimbabwean scene.

Although beautiful, the rocks are slippery, rugged and people have died here as a result.

Stark warning to tread carefully when visiting a splendid set of waterfalls in the Mavuradonha Mountains in northern Zimbabwe. Someone else we know was stuck through the leg by an elephant's tusk whilst wandering in these parts. Africa can be dangerous so exercise extreme common sense at all times that you saunter off the beaten path. However do not let this deter you! Read on!!!!!

Just two hours from Harare on an almost perfect tarmacadam road, you can be in the Mavuradonha Mountains that sit proudly above the plains of the Zambezi Valley.

There are two wildlife areas one west of the main Centenary to Muzarabani Road and the second to the east. The area we feature this month is that to the east. These mountains are basically the northern end of The Great Dyke of Zimbabwe. They are a result of an igneous intrusion into the great Zimbabwe Craton and happened a mere 2.575 billion years ago. A mere blink of an eye ago!





They are rich in minerals, particularly nickel, chrome and platinum group metals with a fair amount of precious metals like gold and silver. Where the heavy and planttoxic heavy metals abound, the mountains consist largely of wiry, unpalatable grasslands, populated by hardy adapted plants that can survive fire. Above we see *Euphorbia wildii*, in its rich autumn colours and left, the drying leaves of *Boophone disticha* whose Latin name indicates that it does not have a kindly disposition to hungry bovines.



Find a rocky ridge and observe the plant life that abounds in the nooks and crannies around you. On the right you can see aloes, kalanchoe, euphorbias and even the blackened stems of *Xerophyta* shrubs. As you all well know, these latter are poikilochlorophyllous pants which lose chlorophyll and they stop photoynthesising and even transpiration. However when it rains they miraculously recover and almost overnight they green-up and often flower beautifully.



On the rocky ridges between 1 400 to 1 500 masl, the endemic *Aloe ortholopha* abounds in the grasslands. Usually where it is protected from fire. This aloe is of course the main part of the emblem of our Society and gives its name to this Newsletter. In flower, because of the background views in these mountains, it is one of the most spectacular sights of the winter veld. If your knees are not too rickety you would be well-advised to take a stroll in these parts.




Further down the mountains you can be led to these wonderful waterfalls, known as Svohwe Falls. The river that arises on the steep slopes above the Mavuradonha Wilderness Eco-Lodge makes these last couple of tumbles before reaching the relatively flat safety of the Zambezi basin below.

Tread carefully in these parts because many an unwary tourist has taken a tumble here and the prognoses have not been good, with a tag on the big toe the usual outcome.

However in this little wooded valley there are several species of tall candelabra-like *Euphor-bia* that abound and the undergrowth is rich with *Sanseveria* spp. and *Fockea* creepers.

Some favourite trees vastly improve the scenes, not least being the *Sterculia* and *Brachystegia tamarindoides* in particular.

Butterflies love everything about this place!



And so we close this little window onto the Mavuradonha Mountains, here framed by the blood-red leaves of the *Hymenodictyon floribundum* or Flame tree. The grassy slope seen is undoubtedly laced with heavy metals and only sparse grass growth is possible, with xerophytic treasures in the rocky places along the knife-edged ridges above.

The Health Corner:

For your health this month we have laid on the relaxing opportunity to admire other people's gardens and lifetimes of green-side-up work. The carefully planned and executed recent love affair with Aloes of the Stutchburys out at Sunlands Close. Then the harsh rocky terrain of Doreen and Mike's Greystone Park residence followed by every gardening style and theme of Brian and Barbara Terry also in Greystone Park. And finally, weary after a meandering route through the Northern suburbs of Harare you can put your feet up and sip sundowners under the canopy of a Miombo woodland at Rob and Sheila Jarvises slightly off the mainstream rails, garden, in Rolf Valley. One thing is for sure you will not be attacked by leonine vermin along the way, because the Ridgebacks of Rockyvale have long since dealt with this particular, but once pervasive, problem. Then on Sunday the monthly meeting at the Waghorn Veterinary surgery in Marlborough.
