



# Open Gardens June 2017

What a fun weekend! Your Society took members on a tour of the suburbs, looking at various gardens that were in the absolute peak season for colour, diversity and interest, We started at the Stutchbury's out near Luna Road, beyond Borrowdale Brooke. Everything was on fire, aloes we have watched for the past couple of seasons are now in theior full splendour with pride of place probably going to the yellow Aloe arborescens (far right).







Thence on to the wonderful hilltop residence of Doreen Richards and Mike Caulfield, Here interesting plants are two a penny, with lifetime collections strategically placed over a hill facing north over the Greystone Park area. Water is at a premium and so the emphasis is on hardy, resilient plants that can survive the months between rains with minimal intervention. In addition to the local aloes, Adeniums and some architecturally magnificent trees like Sterculias and forest fever trees, there are astounding Cacti (above)



And many different species of Euphorbia with the mark of the cross, (left) being a beacon for the bees and nectar-hungry insects of the Highveld. The garden literally hums with vitality at this time of year with a sting on the end of every red nose a very likely possibility!

One feels for Mike and Doreen however as they struggle with water, the municipal supply being all but nonexistent and the difficulty of negotiating their driveway means that the tankers must offload at the bottom of the hill and the water is then pumped to storage at the top.



Brian and Barbara Terry's lovely garden


reflected a lifetime of absolute dedication to the joys of gardening. Their interests have spread from the aloes collected early on for what was once a bleak hillside. Now beautifully landscaped there are multiple areas of interest and no matter how long you spend in their garden, there is a good chance you will still miss something! They have a fantastic collection of African violets and in the open spaces outside their shade rooms there are beds of violets. Bright with colour!!!

Here and there too there are interest plants and if you can control their intrinsic urge to spread through underground runners, then the colourful spines and strong healthy leaves of the agaves make great focal points in this most varied of gardens.

True love has been expended in making the bright splashes of colour, in arranging the architectural plants and in ensuring that the sunbirds face their June smorgasbord of fiery flowers dripping nectar.







The day finally came to a close at the woodland home of Rob and Sheila Jarvis. Luckily the property had been cleared of lion and other vermin by the dedicated selfless application of the family ridgebacks and ACSSZ members were able to safely relax in the shade of indigenous Munondo trees. Both people and dogs were fed with a hearty stew of beef and potatoes and comfortably belching, with stomachs well-filled, they all eventually departed as the last rays of the sun set.
