



Hi Everyone,

The meeting this Sunday 29th May will be at the home of Thoko Saungweme at 15 Warwick Road, Greystone Park. You go down Gaydon Road from the roundabout on Harare Drive, take the second turn right into Warwick and the property is no. 15 on the right. Bring some snacks to share for tea, a plant or similar for the raffle, your hat and a chair. Chairman Hans Wolbert will be talking about the aloe snout beetle, the destruction it can cause and hopefully some tips on control and prevention of damage. Our own rough and ready control is to dust the growing point of all our aloes with the tobacco dust you can get for a couple of dollars from roadside vendors. It seems to work.

I am afraid we shall not be there, at Thoko's, as we are somewhere near the above bridge which to Americans is perhaps as well-loved as Birchenough Bridge is to us Zimbabweans. And lo- and behold within sight of the above bridge in the Conservatory of Flowers in the Golden Gate Park, we found this plant growing and flowering. None other than *Adenium multiflorum*, the Sabi Star! It brought a warm glow to our hearts to see it flowering so happily, tucked away on a shelf in glass-covered buildings that housed some of the most wonderful plants to be found on This Good Earth.

Time to enjoy winter and see the amazing flowers that warm our hearts at this time, especially the aloes that give a bonanza of colour through May, June and July. Get your ride out of the garage, check the oil and water, fill the tank and burn that gas as you go to see the Aloes of Zimbabwe! Leave a trail of Zwl behind you, well spent. Cheers, Mafungi





I guess when plants are growing close to their original centres of origin they are likely to flower better than we would ever see them when flowering out of context. I am pretty sure that most of us have the above succulent growing in our gardens at some stage, but have you ever seen it flowering like this? Largely untended, in a suburban garden in San Francisco, this plant is just a blaze of cheerful spring colour and if we could protect our plants from the onslaught of our summer rains and sprinkle gentler rains in winter, then perhaps we could also trigger such a profusion of flowers.

Of course waterwise-plants, which our succulents are, do not mean that we should consider plants that grow on or near wetlands, are not waterwise. I have no idea what the plant below right, nor the ones on the left are, but they look like succulents but in this case absolutely not short of water and if we want to grow such types, then it is probably best done in a closed system, so get busy and build a conservatory and don't waste precious water trying to create a lowland forest outside.






This is the amazing Amorphophallus titanum plant. We get similar species here in Zimbabwe, they grow from an underground tuberous root and all the aboveground parts of the plant wither away to nothingness during the dry season, but come spring and all the energy stored in the underground tuberous root springs into action and the plant sends up either a new leaf or a flowering stem with a beautiful dark, almost purpleblack, lily-like flower. Ours as you all know are called A. maximus or perhaps A. abyssinicum, but the flower of this Titan seen on this page, may only appear once every 7 to 10 years and it can be 2,5 metres tall and 1.5 metres wide!!!! And it stinks to High Heaven.


This particular species, A. titanum comes from Sumatra, Indonesia and is literally Titanic in its proportions. I would really love to see a flower! Maybe one day!

These are growing in the absolutely stunning floweringplant greenhouses in the grounds of the San Francisco Golden Gate Park in California.

Luckily this particular greenhouse has a high centre portion to the roof, allowing the plant full expression.

Personally I don't think that I would ever sleep in this greenhouse, just in case some of these plants are meateaters. Closing time was 6pm and we were well-clear by then.
